Following his acclaimed debut The Witch, Robert Eggers returns with this highly anticipated psychological thriller that charts the slow descent into madness of two lighthouse keepers on a remote New England island at the turn of the 19th Century.

The starkly beautiful black and white images - shot by cinematographer Jarin Blaschke and the superb sound design, create a hypnotic and hallucinatory fusion of beauty and brutality, that combine powerfully with the extraordinary performances from Dafoe and Pattinson's feuding duo.

DUKE OF YORK'S SUN 17 NOV / 9PM

The latest film from Taika Waititi. director of Hunt for the Wilderpeople, Thor: Ragnarok and What We Do in the Shadows.

Winner of this year's Toronto International Film Festival's Audience Award, Waititi's anti-hate satire follows Jojo, a lonely German boy whose imaginary friend is an idiotic Adolf Hitler (Waititi, in a boisterous performance) in the last days of the Second World War. A keen, though incompetent, member of the Hitler Youth, Jojo's world view is turned upside down when he discovers his single mother (Scarlett Johansson) is hiding a young Jewish girl in their attic.

In a cast rich with comic talent - including Stephen Merchant, Sam Rockwell and Rebel Wilson - Johansson especially dazzles, in this exuberant, irreverent and moving comedy.

DIR: DANA RANGA. FRANCE, GERMANY 1997. 77 MINS. ENGLISH, RUSSIAN WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES.

The Iron Curtain musical is an overlooked phenomenon but this fascinating and highly entertaining documentary explores the little-known genre and features extracts from myriad musicals such as *Tractor Drivers* (USSR), Vacation on the Black Sea (Romania) and The Wayward Wife (Czech/GDR). We are also introduced to the 'Doris Day of the East' and Stalin's favourite musical, the classic Volga, Volga, which he reportedly watched over a hundred times.

The Soviet Union and Eastern Bloc countries produced dozens of musicals between the late '30s and the mid '60s. Hollywood-style entertainment for the masses, they were made to distract audiences from the oppressive political realities of their daily lives and were given a little more freedom to circumvent the regulations that governed the content of most Eastern European cinema. Few, if any, were released in the West.

This special screening on 35mm is dedicated to the writer and producer of *East Side Story*, the award-winning, New York-born, Berlin-based film-maker and journalist Andrew Horn who recently passed away.

OUTSIDE **THE CITY**

DIR: NICK HAMER. UK 2019. 80 MINS.

The monks of Mt St Bernard Abbey are a community of 25 men, half of them over 80 years old. This beautifully filmed documentary follows the monks as they move from dairy farming to brewing as they attempt to open the first Trappist brewery in the UK.

The stakes are high; if their historic counter-cultural lifestyle is to survive, the venture must succeed. Meanwhile as the monks reflect on spirituality, ageing and the approaching end of life, the number of burials in the Abbey graveyard continues to grow.

Director Nick Hamer spent a year with the monks, gaining privileged access to document their hidden lives. They have turned their backs on the material, consumer society, to focus instead on contemplative spirituality and to maintain an age-old religious tradition. DIR: CÉLINE SCIAMMA.

In late eighteenth century France, two women go for long walks together along the Brittany cliffs. One is Héloïse (Adèle Haenel), the sheltered yet headstrong daughter of a wealthy noblewoman. The other is her hired companion, Marianne (Noémie Merlant), a painter secretly employed by Héloïse's mother to create a portrait of her daughter in the hope that such a painting will attract a wealthy husband. However, as the two women grow closer, the characters' motivations blur and shift, eventually giving way to a simmering, haunting romance.

Romance, eroticism and art collide in this sumptuous masterpiece from Céline Sciamma, the first female-directed film to win the Queer Palm at Cannes, where it also won the Best Screenplay award.

Renowned for gritty, social-realist coming-of-age tales like *Girlhood* (CINECITY 2014) and Water Lilies (CINECITY 2007), the film marks a distinctive turn for Sciamma. *Portrait of a Lady on Fire* moves her focus away from contemporary concerns and back in time to a more lush, sensuous style of film-making. What remains is a fiercely feminist commitment to exploring women's stories, a masterful command of image and sound, and a unique cinematic vision.

SONS OF DENMARK

DIR: ULAA SALIM. WITH: MOHAMMED ISMAIL MOHAMMED. ZAKI YOUSSEF, RASMUS BJERG. DENMARK 2019. 117 MINS. DANISH AND ARABIC WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES.

Copenhagen, the near future. One year after a major terrorist attack, ethnic tensions and racial violence are boiling over. A far-right party, capitalising on the national mood with a platform of ethnic cleansing, looks set to sweep the upcoming parliamentary elections. This is the context for this disarmingly timely debut from Ulaa Salim, who drew on his own experience of growing up in Denmark for the screenplay.

Zakaria (Mohammed Ismail Mohammed) is a 19-year-old of Iraqi descent. In a desperate response to his immediate situation he joins a radical organisation

and forms a close bond with the older and more experienced Ali (Zaki Youssef), with whom he plans to assassinate Martin Nordahl (Rasmus Bjerg), leader of the National Movement party. But such schemes rarely go to plan and the pair will find their loyalties - to ideals, to their country, and to each other - tested to breaking point.

A tense, powerful and provocative political thriller, with echoes of the great Jacques Audiard (A Prophet), Sons of Denmark has picked up a host of awards on the film festival circuit.

An intimate epic spanning three decades in the lives of two Chinese families, So Long, My Son is an unforgettable cinematic experience.

In the early 80s, Liyun, a factory worker, becomes pregnant for the second time, falling foul of the national policy of one-child families. Set against the social and political upheaval in China through to the present day, the private and the political merge in this moving drama of personal and national destinies.

An exquisite ensemble piece from director Wang Xiaoshuai (Beijing Bicycle) that is as formally inventive as it is emotionally powerful, the film's two leads won the Best Actor and Best Actress awards at this year's Berlin Film Festival

An engaging portrait of a woman rebuilding her life after it has been completely dismantled, *Alice* is a blistering showcase for actress Emilie Piponnier in her first lead role.

Alice, a happy and perfect wife and mother has her life turned upside down when she discovers her husband is living a secret life. Broke, alone, and suddenly saddled with sole financial responsibility, Alice must completely reinvent herself in order to survive. What follows is a complicated, nuanced tale of female empowerment, sexual politics, and how easily people can slip through the cracks of society.

Josephine Mackerras' debut feature was awarded the Grand Jury Prize at SXSW earlier this year. Hard-hitting but at times bitingly funny, Alice demonstrates how, even with the smallest of budgets, genuine talent shines through.

DUKE OF YORK'S **SUN 10 NOV / 6PM**

A talented ensemble take on contemporary family life in this bold, masterful drama. Tyler (Kelvin Harrison Jr) is a high-school wrestling star with a loving girlfriend Alexis (Alexa Demie), a stern but supportive father (Sterling K Brown) and a bright future ahead of him. He's on track to graduate with a university scholarship, but the combination of family pressures, a shoulder injury, and some bad news from Alexis drives Tyler to start popping prescription painkillers. His golden existence starts to fracture around him, a trajectory that is almost unbearably tense to watch. Yet just as the audience starts to feel we have a handle on where the film might be going, Waves displaces us entirely.

Director Trey Edward Shults is a confident, ambitious film-maker, playing with aspect ratio and a shifting colour palette to ensure Waves gets under the viewer's skin. He's aided in this by the brilliantly anxious score from Trent Reznor and Atticus Ross, as well as by a roster of magnificent performances.

A visually inventive, emotionally taut and compelling experience. Waves has garnered terrific word of mouth and reviews at all its festival screenings.

The UK premiere of a new live score to a classic 'city symphony', marking the 30th anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall.

Made in 1927, Walter Ruttmann's definitive 'city film' is a dawn to dusk portrait of 1920s Berlin, combining documentary, abstract and lyrical imagery.

With Karl Freund's masterly camerawork and the film's assured editing, it was highly successful on its release and that rarity - a film both popular and avant-garde.

The 'city symphony' became a fully-fledged film genre, whose characters were the railway, the dance of the trams, the magic of electricity and the roar of automobiles. From this rapidly developing city arose a resounding combination of new sounds, now given a new dimension by musicians Simon Fisher Turner, Klara Lewis and Rainier Lericolais.

KLARA LEWIS

Klara Lewis is a Swedish musician-composer whose albums have been released to great acclaim. She builds her work from heavily manipulated samples and field recordings, creating a unique combination of the organic and the digital. She was named Emerging Artist of the Year by BBC 6 Music DJ Mary Anne Hobbs.

SIMON FISHER TURNER

Simon Fisher Turner is an award-winning UK composer and musician. He collaborated with Derek Jarman on most of his film work and has also scored films for Mike Hodges, Michael Almareyda and Lodge Kerrigan.

RAINIER LERICOLAIS

Rainier Lericolais is a multidisciplinary artist and musician based in Paris. He works in a wide variety of media and has collaborated with a diverse range of artists. He is also a member of the band Minizza.

THE ORPHANAGE

Cinema is everything for 15-year-old street kid Qodrat (Qodratollah Qadiri) growing up in late 1980s Kabul. Not only is he a devoted fan who never misses a new release, he also depends on the sale of black-market Bollywood tickets in order to live. Eventually caught by the police, Qodrat is placed in an orphanage where he has to learn new methods of survival. Outside, the Afghan-Soviet war has begun to tear the country apart and inside, institutional bullying and oppression threaten to overwhelm. Luckily, Qodrat has an escape strategy: the elaborate, joyous Bollywood-esque musical numbers he stages in his imagination.

Director Shahrbanoo Sadat (Wolf and Sheep, CINECITY 2016) drew from the memoirs of friend Anwar Hashimin, who grew up during the last days of Soviet control of Afghanistan. Illuminating a key historical moment, The Orphanage is both a coming-of-age tale as well as an impassioned argument for the joy that movie musicals can bring to even the most hopeless of situations.



A cinematic ceremony composed in four acts based on Edgar Allan Poe's poem The Bells. The poetic gesture functions as a performed amulet for protection, fine-tunes perceptions of Earth and humankind's disjointed and entangled processes. The film score is made by creating translations of marks found on used shooting targets.

The work touches upon notions of revolution looking into its etymological origin; the revolving as the origin of a cyclical movement found in celestial bodies: 'an instance of revolving, to revolve, revolvere; roll back, unroll, unwind; happen again, return; go over, repeat, 'back, again' 'to turn over (in the mind or heart), meditate.'

THE OLD MARKET

DIR: MARK BLANE, BEN MANKOFF. WITH: MARK BLANE, PATRICIA RICHARDSON, MON 11 NOV / 8PM CHRISTIAN PATRICK. USA 2019. 83 MINS.



A gutsy, psychedelic and unforgettable debut from a promising new queer voice.

Co-director Mark Blane also stars as Mark, a young gay misfit who moves from Indiana to New York City to work on his sexually explicit artwork. He lies to his mother, telling her he has been hired at a prestigious art gallery, whereas in reality, he's babysitting 6-year-old Milo and trying to figure out how to earn enough to make the rent. Despite the joy Mark finds in his close friendship with Milo, the daily challenges of trying to survive in the big city are compounded when he starts to run out of his anti-anxiety medication. Salvation comes in the form of Leatherman (real-life BDSM legend Christian Patrick), a very adult superhero conjured up after eating a hallucinogenic cupcake.

Shot on gorgeously grainy 16mm, Cubby is a quirky, personal tale about the importance of caring for others, while letting yourself be cared for.

Award-winning war photographer and film-maker Seamus Murphy explores the creative inspiration behind PJ Harvey's ninth

Inspired by the songs and stories they encounter on the road, Murphy and Harvey examine the many ways in which music unites communities in areas of conflict and deprivation. Throughout their travels together in Afghanistan, Kosovo and the US, he collects footage and images, while she notes down snatches of the lyrics which will later form her album, The Hope Six Demolition Project. Back in London, Harvey inverts these ideas of documentation and scrutiny by inviting the public to observe the album's recording behind one-way glass during a five week installation at Somerset House. Murphy's film delves into each track of the album, unearthing the layers of process behind their creation, and the people and places that inspired them.

Dreamlike, elliptical and intimate, the film provides a powerful portrait of Harvey's creative process and unprecedented access

An authentic and heart-warming love story as a young couple struggle to manage personal hardship at the start of their blossoming relationship. This impressive debut feature marks actor turned writer-director Aki Omoshaybi as a real talent to watch.

In an unremarkable inner-city area, sparks fly between well-dressed Kyle (Aki Omoshaybi) and equally poised Jamie (Pippa Bennett-Warner). Yet despite their outward appearances, both are struggling to move on from hardship they'd rather keep hidden. As their pasts resurface, threatening to break them apart before their relationship has even begun, the growing intimacy between the pair is captured beautifully in Omoshaybi's tender drama.

DIR: ANDREA LUKA ZIMMERMAN, ADRIAN JACKSON, UK 2019, 87 MINS,

A unique collaboration between film-maker Andrea Luka Zimmerman and theatre director Adrian Jackson. Here for Life traces the interwoven lives of ten Londoners (plus one dog) living at the margins of society. Produced by Artangel, the film was awarded a Special Mention at the recent Locarno Film Festival

Location is as crucial to the narrative as it was in Zimmerman's previous feature, *Estate, A Reverie* (CINECITY 2015) which documented the demolition of the Haggerston estate in Hackney and the effect on its former inhabitants. Here, the setting is Nomadic Community Gardens, a reclaimed collaborative garden in East London.

The importance of preserving community spaces in an increasingly fractured world is key to the film-makers' vision: Zimmerman and Jackson worked with a troupe of actors who portray versions of themselves, blurring the line between fact and fiction, the individual and the collective. A rallying cry for resistance, survival and collective action.

The second feature from Levan Akin, a Swedish-born film-maker of Georgian descent, was one of the most talked-about titles at this year's Directors' Fortnight strand at Cannes. Featuring stunning examples of traditional Georgian dance and an extraordinarily physical performance from lead Levan Gelbakhiani, this is a gripping drama and love story that captures both the beauty and repressive social values of Tbilisi



A heartbreakingly fresh-faced Bjork stars in Nietzchka Keene's mystical and haunting fairytale, lavishly restored for this long-awaited reissue. Filmed in rich monochrome, the film draws loose inspiration from a macabre tale from the Brothers Grimm to weave a mysterious spell that audiences will find hard to shake off.

Sisters Margit (Björk) and Katla (Bryndis Petra Bragadóttir) have fled their village after their mother is killed for alleged witchcraft. On the run in the harsh landscape, the sisters encounter a widower named Johann (Valdimar Örn Flygenring), and his son Jonas (Geirlaug Sunna Þormar). The quartet form an uneasy family unit, which is troubled by Johann's growing attraction to Katla and her own burgeoning supernatural powers.

Björk's considerable fan-base won't want to miss her screen debut. Yet her performance, vital and riveting as it is, is far from the film's only draw. Viewers will find themselves seduced by the film's timeless, dreamlike air, the echoes of Bergman, Dreyer and Lynch, and the dark delight of its revisionist ending.

"You know how to whistle, don't you, Steve? You just put your lips together and blow." There's more than an echo of Lauren Bacall's famous pick-up line from *To Have and Have Not* in this enjoyably tangled, hard-boiled thriller. Corruption, crime, and whistling: they're all integral to this darkly comic slice of Romanian cinema from the director of 12:08 East of Bucharest and Police, Adjective.

Cristi (Vlad Ivanov) is a corrupt Bucharest policeman who has become helplessly enmeshed in the international money-laundering scheme he is supposed to be investigating. Under surveillance by his superiors and romantically entangled with the girlfriend of a crime boss, Cristi follows the scent of money to La Gomera in the Canary Islands. Here, our dishonest hero has to learn el siblo, the island's ancient whistling language. Only by convincingly communicating in whistles can Cristi decode the mobsters' schemes and seduce the alluring Gilda, her name another throwback to Hollywood's heyday.

From the convoluted machinations of the criminal schemes to the film's subversion of traditional genre tropes, *The Whistlers* is a deadpan, double-crossing delight.



Puppeteers Judy (Mia Wasikowska) and Punch (Damon Herriman) live in the landlocked town of Seaside, a violent and lawless place overrun by witch hunts and hangings. The couple attempt to rise above their surroundings through their marionette show, but Judy's undeniable skill is overshadowed by her husband's proclivity for drinking and womanising. Judy's frustration with her layabout spouse reaches new levels of outrage when she tasks him with watching over their newborn baby for a morning, a decision that has disastrous consequences for everyone involved. From here, the film develops into a magical, darkly comic fable with a feminist twist







Winner of the Special Jury Prize at Venice, Jennifer Kent's long-awaited follow-up to The Babadook is a lacerating revenge period thriller.

The film is set in Tasmania in 1825 during the Black War, a period of bloody fighting between British colonialists and Aboriginal Australians. Clare (Aisling Franciosi) is an Irish convict imprisoned by a cruel master, Lieutenant Hawkins (Sam Claflin) who refuses to release her from her overdue bondage. Driven to seek revenge after being repeatedly raped, Clare hires an Aboriginal tracker, Billy (Baykali Ganambarr) - also marked by trauma from his own violence-filled past - to guide her in her quest.

The film's depiction of sexual and racial violence has led some viewers to walk out of the cinema, but Kent has argued that they are necessary to accurately portray the reality of colonial violence. She worked closely with Tasmanian Indigenous elders in scripting the film and the scenes are filmed with a brutal sensitivity that underscores the degradation and trauma of the acts. For viewers who can take it, The Nightingale is a powerful, vital investigation of power dynamics, colonialism, and rage.

IT MUST BE HEAVEN

From award-winning director Elia Suleiman (Chronicle of a Disappearance, Divine Intervention), an absurdist comic saga exploring identity, nationality and belonging, in which he asks the fundamental question: where is the place we can truly call home? Suleiman himself plays the central character who escapes from Palestine seeking an alternative homeland, only to find that Palestine is trailing behind him. The promise of a new life turns into a comedy of errors: however far he travels, from Paris to New York, something always reminds him of home.

It Must Be Heaven received the Jury Special Mention and Critics' Awards at this year's Cannes and is Palestine's entry for Best Foreign Language Film at the Academy Awards.

A standout portrait of teenage female friendship from the director of *Suffragette* and *Brick Lane*.

Olushola (Bukky Bakray), nicknamed 'Rocks' after she bravely stood up to bullies on behalf of her best friend, is an ordinary teenage girl living in East London. The rhythms and concerns of her life are typical for someone of her age, hanging out with her all-female crew and helping to take care of her 7-year-old brother Emmanuel (D'angelou Osei Kissiedu). Typical, that is, until Rocks comes home from school one day to discover that her mother has abandoned them, leaving behind some money and a vague note of apology. Wary of letting the authorities find out, Rocks decides to take charge of the situation herself.

Director Sarah Gavron and writers Theresa Ikoko and Claire Wilson workshopped the film for a year with first-time actors, a process of collaborative improvisation that lends the film a beautifully realised naturalism. Rocks is a joyful, resilient shot of energy and a humane reminder of the strength and power of community.

Three years after the tragic death of their young daughter, married couple Elin (Ylva Gallon) and Tobias (Leif Edlund) are attempting a return to normalcy by taking a camping holiday together. Unsurprisingly, the trip gets off to a rocky start as the couple argue and bicker. However, the arrival of three curious strangers from the woods sets off a chain of events unlike anything anyone could have anticipated. To their, and our, increasing horror, Elin and Tobias find themselves being murdered again and again and again, caught in a seemingly never-ending loop of death, torture and pitch-black comedy.





DAYS OF THE BAGNOLD **SUMMER**

Gloomy 15-year-old Daniel (Earl Cave) has a couple of things to sustain him; his beloved Metallica and the prospect of spending the summer in Florida with his father and stepmother. The trip would be a welcome reprieve from living with his mum Sue (Monica Dolan), a dowdy librarian who doesn't fully understand her metalhead son. Yet when Daniel's dad cancels the holiday at the very last minute, the prospect of a dull suburban summer yawns out ahead of him.

Inbetweener Simon Bird strikes a bittersweetly comic note for his directorial debut, adapted from the graphic novel by Joff Winterhart. The film, written by Bird's wife Lisa Owens, treats its characters with a warmth and generosity, spending as much time with the unassuming Sue as it does with her outcast son. A crisp, minimal visual style nods to the film's graphic novel origin, while the music, all original songs provided by beloved indie band Belle & Sebastian, adds a cheery pathos.

Benni (Helena Zengel) is nine years old and out of control. She is what social services deem a 'system crasher', a child so troubled that they are unplaceable: unfit for school, too violent for care homes, too young for a residential programme. Even her own mother has given her up, unable to give adequate care and frankly scared of her daughter's uncontrollable outbursts. Benni does have one person on her side, her child welfare caseworker, who is determined to find her a home.

Although Benni and the film are fictional, Fingscheidt's documentary background roots the drama in well-researched reality, revealing the daily challenges and frustrations of those working and living in the care system. However, the film's true energy emanates from one source alone, the whirlwind of Helena Zengel in the lead role. It's an effortlessly intense performance, with the young actress balancing the character's anarchic behaviour with a haunting, melancholy streak.

Liam Neeson and Lesley Manville play a long-married couple coping with a cancer diagnosis in this subtle, empathetic character study written by playwright Owen McCafferty.

Both retired, Joan and Tom live a life of comforting routines and habit, having finally come to terms with the death of their daughter many years before. This day-to-day existence is troubled, however, by the sudden news that Joan has breast cancer. Everything ordinary is turned on its head as the pair must navigate new eruptions of anger and fear, hospital bureaucracy and interminable waiting rooms.

Viewers used to watching Leeson in an action-film context should take pleasure in watching him in a more thoughtful, dramatic role; his relationship with Lesley Manville's character feels intimate, lived-in and warm. She, meanwhile, is the film's true beating heart, giving a sensitive nuanced performance that gives the lie to the idea that there is any such thing as an ordinary love.

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

There will also be a special talk led by Jo Duncombe, British Council's Film Programme Manager, about festival strategy and British Council's Travel Grant Scheme.













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
