FIRST SIGHT

Our annual celebration of cinema and the big screen experience takes place across Brighton and Lewes and presents the very best in international cinema with a diverse programme of premieres and previews. The line-up gives audiences first sight of highly anticipated titles ahead of their UK release and showcases many others brought to CINECITY from around the world for one-off screenings.

PACKED PROGRAMME

In addition to the latest dramas, documentaries and animation, CINECITY 2023 features live soundtracks, perfume-enhanced and 3D screenings, locally-made shorts, archive treasures, draw-to-film, director Q&As and a whole host of guests sharing their passion for cinema. There's also the inside story of a riotous independent cinema; a tribute to a Brighton film-making legend; a once-banned paean to acid house; and a celebration of one of the greatest film-making duos of all time.

Main venues are Duke of York's Picturehouse, Depot Lewes, Fabrica, Attenborough Centre for the Creative Arts and Duke's at Komedia with more one-off events at Horatios Bar, The Lord Nelson, East Street Tap and Dead Wax Social.

CINECITY opens and closes with previews of two of this year's most eagerly awaited films and provides an early look at lots more awardwinning titles that will help shape the cinema landscape in the months ahead. There is also the chance to discover, or re-discover, classics and rarely-seen gems on the big screen.

LIVE CINEMA

Live cinema has been a key part of CINECITY since our first festival back in 2003. This year as part of a programme of live events, we are delighted to present *In Spring*, a city symphony devoted to Kyiv made in 1929 and featuring a live score from accomplished Ukrainian composer and pianist Roksana Smirnova with long-term collaborator and countryman Misha Kalinin.

REGIONAL TALENT

Our showcase for regional talent continues, selected from open submissions to the festival. This includes the New Voices programme for those aged 25 and under supported by Screen and Film School, Brighton.

DIR: YORGOS LANTHIMOS. WITH: EMMA STONE, MARK RUFFALO, WILLEM DAFOE, RAMY YOUSSEF UK 2023. 141 MINS.

Yorgos Lanthimos' much-anticipated follow-up to The Favourite is an extraordinary Victorian sci-fi mash-up that celebrates female empowerment.

After ending her life by suicide, Bella Baxter is rescued and reanimated by her scientist guardian, possessing the body of a woman but the brain of a baby. As she develops, her curiosity leads her on a quest for knowledge and pleasure.

There are wonderful comic performances from Emma Stone as the free-spirited heroine and Mark Ruffalo, a disreputable solicitor who whisks Bella off to Europe. Lavish production design and distinctive cinematography create a visually stunning steampunk aesthetic.

Adapted from Alasdair Gray's novel, Poor Things won the prestigious Golden Lion at this year's Venice Film Festival. It is a glorious and beguiling cinematic experience.

DIR: ANDREW HAIGH, WITH: ANDREW SCOTT, PAUL MESCAL, JAMIE BELL, CLAIRE FOY. UK 2023, 105 MINS.

Leading Irish actors Andrew Scott and Paul Mescal star in a haunting story of love and loss.

A tentative relationship begins between Adam, a lonely screenwriter (played with melancholic intensity by Scott) and his high-rise neighbour Harry (a scruffily charismatic Mescal). As the connection between the two men develops, Adam visits his childhood home and makes a mystifying discovery about his parents (Jamie Bell and Claire Foy) who died when he was 12 years old. Adam keeps returning to this dreamlike space between the past and present, drawn to the era of his youth while questioning his current existence.

All of Us Strangers is adapted from Taichi Yamada's novel by acclaimed director and screenwriter Andrew Haigh (45 Years, Looking, and Weekend). It is a powerfully emotive study of the desire for acceptance and the possibility of closure.

Over two nights CINECITY explores 1970s and 1980s film and music rebel cultures in Algeria and Jamaica as exemplars of wider resistance perspectives from the Global South.

Curated by Professor Martin Evans (University of Sussex) for the Resistance Studies Network at Sussex and the Middle East and North African Centre at Sussex (MENACS).

FRI 10 NOV / 7:30PM THE LAST QUEEN

DIR: ADILA BENDIMERAD AND DAMIEN OUNOURI. FRANCE/ALGERIA 2022. 110 MINS. ARABIC WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES

Algeria, 1516. The pirate Aruj Barbarossa frees
Algiers from Spanish tyranny but then seizes power
over the kingdom. Against all odds, one woman stands
up to him - Queen Zaphira - in a remarkable story of
personal and political female resistance. Algeria's first
ever costume drama, this film is groundbreaking
because it changes the focus away from the Algerian
War 1954-62 and the political violence of the 1990s,
the two dominant subjects in Algerian cinema, to
consider a much earlier period when the country
became incorporated into the Ottoman Empire.

SAT 11 NOV / 4 - 11PM REGGAE AND RAÏ:

RESISTANCE MUSIC FROM JAMAICA AND ALGERIA

Reggae from Jamaica and rai from Algeria are two musical forms that emerged from the Global South in the 1970s and 1980s and carried the same message: resistance to authority. Through a mixture of rare screenings, conversations and DJ sets, this event will connect these two musical rebel cultures, exploring their roots and impact.

THE FILMS

RAÏ IS NOT DEAD

DIR: HADJ SAMEER. FRANCE 2022. 19 MIN

From Oran in Algeria to Barbès in Paris, the DJ Hadj Sameer's six-part documentary series traces the tumultuous course of raï, whose hit makers like Khaled became planet-wide stars in the 1980s and 1990s. Travelling back and forth between Algeria and France, his journey takes the form of a mythical soundtrack, to the sources of a hybrid and transgressive music that continues to reinvent itself. This specific episode focuses upon the city where it all began - Oran - and shows how raï music became the expression of rebellion for a young generation who felt at odds with the Algerian post-independence state.

CHEB HASNI

DIR: M'RAH ABDELLATIF. 2004. 60 MINS

M'rah Abdellatif's documentary charts the remarkable life of the Oran raï singer, Cheb Hasni, tragically murdered in 1994 aged just 26 during Algeria's 'Black Decade' which witnessed huge violence between the Algeria regime and various Islamist groups. Broadcast on Algerian television ten years after his death, the film portrays a society still grieving at the loss of one of the country's brightest stars; a rebel voice whose songs confronted taboo subjects such as sex. divorce and alcohol.



DIR: PERRY HENZELL. WITH: JIMMY CLIFF, JANET BARTLEY, CARL BRADSHAW. UK 1972. 102 MINS.

With dreams of becoming a successful reggae singer, a young Jamaican man played by the charismatic Jimmy Cliff finds his path blocked by corrupt record producers and the drug pushers they're connected to.

An explosive action thriller with a killer soundtrack, this film is universally credited with introducing reggae to the world. On its release Perry Henzell's visceral portrait of the country's music industry was a sensation in Jamaica because the film used real locations and the actors spoke in patois. Now, for the first time, ordinary Jamaicans saw themselves and their daily struggles depicted on screen.

CAPTURING COLOUR

Early film-makers were fascinated by the question – how can I bring colour to the screen? Before the advent of 'true' colour film in the 1930s, this was done by various ingenious means: hand-colouring, tinting, stencilling and the use of revolving tinted filters. Frank Gray, early film historian and now retired director of Screen Archive South East, explores coloured films through examples found in the archive's collection. He will present a range of 'changed' black & white films: James Williamson's early dramas filmed on the streets of Hove, Smith's two-colour system known as Kinemacolor (the world's first coloured film system) and what may be the earliest surviving film of Lewes – Pathé's stencil-coloured view of the town. Frank is the author of *The Brighton School and the Birth of British Film* (2019) and is an authority on early film in Sussex.



DUKE OF YORK'S SAT 11 NOV /4:30PM FALLEN LEAVES

DIR: AKI KAURISMÄKI. WITH: ALMA PÖYSTI, JUSSI VATANEN, JANNE HYYTIÄINEN. FINLAND 2023. 81 MINS. FINNISH WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES

Two lonely people seek the possibility of romance despite a multitude of obstacles in a delightful bittersweet comedy.

This 2023 Cannes Jury Prize winner by Finnish director Aki Kaurismäki (The Other Side of Hope, Leningrad Cowboys Go America), depicts a tentative relationship between Ansa and Holappa after a chance encounter at a karaoke bar. Their subsequent date at a cinema suggests the possibility of true love but the couple face a series of difficulties that threaten their future together.

With understated dialogue, visual gags, rock music, and references to the conflict in Ukraine, Kaurismäki creates a melancholy yet poetic world, interspersed with vivid bursts of colour. Despite the challenges faced by its characters, *Fallen Leaves* is an uplifting testimony to human resilience and the desire for connection.

THE BIKERIDERS



DIR: JEFF NICHOLS.
WITH: JODIE COMER, AUSTIN BUTLER,

USA 2023. 116 MINS.

The freewheeling lives of a Chicago motorcycle gang in the 1960s and 70s are depicted in an absorbing drama full of memorable performances from a stellar cast. Despite its focus on the hyper-masculine world of the Vandals, the story unfolds from the perspective of Kathy (an excellent Jodie Comer) who begins a turbulent relationship with brooding, leather-clad Benny (Austin Butler). The film recognises the appeal of the group's anti-establishment attitude and camaraderie, but doesn't shy away from exploring its problematic aspects. As the years pass, the gang's behaviour shifts into bleaker and more violent territory.

While referencing other biker classics such as *The Wild One*, as well as Martin Scorsese's *Goodfellas*, director Jeff Nichols (*Midnight Special*, Loving, and Mud) drew particular inspiration from a 1968 book by photographer (and co-screenwriter) Danny Lyon which documented the real-life Chicago Outlaws Motorcycle Club. *The Bikeriders* is a skilful portrait of an outsider community that powerfully evokes a particular time and place in America.


THE MOTHER AND THE WHORE



DIR: JEAN EUSTACHE. WITH: JEAN-PIERRE LÉAUD, BERNADETTE LAFONT, FRANÇOISE LEBRUN. FRANCE 1973. 219 MINS. FRENCH WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES

After the French New Wave, the sexual revolution, and May '68 came *The Mother and the Whore*, the legendary, autobiographical magnum opus by Jean Eustache that captured a disillusioned generation navigating the post-idealism 1970s within the microcosm of a ménage à trois. The aimless, clueless, Parisian pseudo-intellectual Alexandre (Jean-Pierre Léaud) lives with his tempestuous older girlfriend, Marie (Bernadette Lafont), and begins a dalliance with the younger, sexually liberated Veronika (Françoise Lebrun, Eustache's own former lover), leading to a volatile open relationship marked by everyday emotional violence and subtle but catastrophic shifts in power dynamics. Transmitting his own sex life to the screen with a startling immediacy, Eustache achieves an intimacy so deep it cuts. Screening in a new restoration from Janus Films.

DIR: ALISA KOVALENKO. UKRAINE/FRANCE/POLAND 2023. 98 MINS. UKRAINIAN, RUSSIAN WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES



A highly acclaimed, deeply moving portrait of a generation that, in spite of everything, is able to recognise and celebrate the fragile beauty of life.

In 2019 Alisa Kovalenko started filming teenagers in the Donbas region of Ukraine to record the hopes and dreams of a generation growing up with military conflict rumbling in the background. When Andriy, Illia, Lera, Liza and Ruslan win a competition for a trip of a lifetime to Nepal to see the Himalayas, the full-scale invasion of their country in February 2022 looked set to destroy the last remnants of hope.

Filmed over a three-year period in the battle-scarred Donbas, the five young Ukrainians, like teenagers everywhere, are busy living their lives and looking to the future. Rather than focusing on the conflict, the film weaves a tender portrait of the teenagers' coming of age. However, this story of hope and strength is also a testimony to the cruel effects of the war on this generation. After the invasion last year, director Alisa Kovalenko broke off her work on the film and spent four months in a volunteer fighting unit of the Ukrainian Armed Forces before returning to complete *We Will Not Fade Away*.

JAPANESE WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES

A young boy named Mahito yearning for his mother ventures into a world shared by the living and the dead. There, death comes to an end, and life finds a new beginning. A semi-autobiographical fantasy about life, death and creation, in tribute to friendship, from the mind of Hayao Miyazaki.





Joanna Hogg's highly anticipated latest film stars Tilda Swinton, Hogg's long-time collaborator, in dual leading roles.

An artist and her elderly mother confront long-buried secrets when they return to a former family home, now a hotel haunted by its mysterious past. Featuring a towering, deeply moving performance by Tilda Swinton, acclaimed filmmaker Joanna Hogg's beguiling latest film is a brilliant and captivating exploration of parental relationships and the things we leave behind.

Hogg's singular direction and Swinton's exceptional talent combine to create a powerfully affecting cinematic experience, delving into the complexities of familial bonds and the weight of unresolved history, weaving together a tale of emotional depth and introspection.





DIR: JANE GILES, ALI CATTERALL. UK 2023. 96 MINS.

OR, THE INCREDIBLY STRANGE RISE AND FALL OF THE WORLD'S WILDEST CINEMA AND HOW IT INFLUENCED A MIXED-UP GENERATION OF WEIRDOS AND MISFITS.

The glory days of one of London's most loved and infamous independent cinemas is charted in a riotous documentary.

Described as 'a country club for criminals and lunatics', the Scala became a beacon and refuge for the city's film lovers, creatives and LGBTQIA+ community during the repressive Thatcher era. Its programming offered a weird and wonderful mix of everything from high-art classics to sexploitation, horror, kung fu and LGBTQIA+ cinema in daily changing double-bills and unforgettable all-nighters.

Drawing on source material from a book written by former Scala programmer Jane Giles - who co-directs with Ali Catterall - this inside story features a

glorious mash-up of film clips, archive footage, animation and interviews with directors, musicians and writers including Ben Wheatley, John Waters, Adam Buxton, Stephen Woolley, Caroline Catz, Ralph Brown, Mary Harron, Peter Strickland, Beeban Kidron, Isaac Julien and Stewart Lee. As well as featuring onscreen, Barry Adamson also composed music for the documentary.

Although it closed in 1993, the Scala has had an enduring influence on those lucky enough to step through its doors.

WHERE IS HEAVEN



An engaging and poignant documentary about living off grid.

Maverick soul mates Ged and Dave are on a mission through the winding lanes and hidden tracks of North Devon, to record the lives and experiences of people living without mains electricity. Where is Heaven features an eclectic mix of characters, originating from all walks of life, who, for their own personal reasons, have chosen an existence that also re-connects them with nature. Filmed over a period of ten years, the documentary builds into a fascinating

group portrait as it follows the joys, trials and tribulations of living off grid in a beautiful but at times challenging environment.

This rich tapestry of personalities, stunning landscapes and the musical accompaniment of Cosmo Sheldrake, combine to deliver a perfect antidote to the intensity of life in the modern world.

Devon-based director Gerard Bryan is an experienced filmmaker and art director, having worked on popular TV series as well as features including *Penelope* and *The Sweeney*.

MALAYSIA-TAIWAN-SINGAPORE-FRANCE-GERMANY-NETHERLANDS-INDONESIAQATAR 2023. 95 MINS. MALAY WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES

The horror of untamed adolescence is unleashed in an exhilarating female coming of age story.

At a school for girls in Malaysia, 12-year-old Zaffan (a captivating Zafreen Zairizal) is the cheeky rebel among her friends. But when she is the first to reach puberty, her friends turn against her. As Zaffan attempts to cope with being ostracised, her physical transformation develops in a shocking and unforeseen manner. This feature debut by director and screenwriter Amanda Nell Eu became the first Malaysian film to win the Grand Prize at this year's Cannes Critics week, a strand of the main festival set up to discover emerging talent.

Tiger Stripes is a fierce and engaging depiction of a young woman's attempts to embrace her inner monster and achieve self-acceptance.

MATKA JOANNA OD ANIOŁÓW

(MOTHER JOAN OF THE ANGELS) DIR: JERZY KAWALEROWICZ. POLAND 1961. 110 MINS. POLISH WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES

A 'Draw to Film' event for artists and beginners alike, featuring a fascinating black and white Polish film classic with stunning cinematography.

When a prioress, Mother Joan, and other nuns are possessed by demons in a monastery in east Poland in the 18th century, the church authorities send Father Suryn to perform an exorcism. Winner of the Jury Prize Award at the 1961 Cannes Film Festival, the film was included in a screening series of 24 restored classic Polish films in 2014, organised and curated by Martin Scorsese as 'Masterpieces of Polish Cinema'.

A particularly exciting visual treat to draw from, the event is facilitated by Jane Fordham. It will be informal and is open to artists and inexperienced drawers alike. You will be drawing in the dark and will be encouraged to capture not what is necessarily there but your sense of what you saw. All drawing materials are included in the ticket price. Please note we are unable to admit late comers.

PEOPLE LIKEUS -THE LIBRARY OF BABEL

THE LIBRARY OF BABEL is a vast library of words. Some combine to make stories of consequence, others are nonsensical. Using dense collage and splintered narrative, *The Library of Babel* by People Like Us is a journey through cinema and sound where the actors are set adrift from their story, left with pure experience. Since 1991 British artist Vicki Bennett has been working across the field of audio-visual collage, repurposing pre-existing footage to craft audio and video collages with an equally dark and witty take on popular culture.

SUPPORT - BLEVIN BLECTUM (aka Bevin Kelley) develops sonic sci-fi fantasy in its most decadent technicolour forms, fuelling the journey of OMNII - her latest audio/visual solo adventure, released by Deathbomb Arc records (digital and cassette, vinyl to follow). OMNII is the soundtrack to a lost space opera, falling perfectly within the gaps between *Barbarella*, *The Beast in Space* and *Planet of the Vampires*.

DOROTHY TOWERS

WITH LIVE SCORE

SEAN BURNS + Q&A

This is the story of the legendary Clydesdale and Cleveland Towers, residential blocks in the centre of Birmingham. Completed in 1971 as a social housing development, the towers are located adjacent to Birmingham's Gay Village.

Shot on 16mm, the film explores the complex relationship between architecture, community and memory. It features testimonials from residents and explores ideas of queer kinship and inheritance alongside experiences of HIV/AIDS in the 1980s/'90s. *Dorothy Towers* frames the buildings in a continuum of history that extends back to the city's post-war redevelopment via its modernist underpasses and nightclubs.

This screening will be accompanied by a live score, composed and performed by Sean Burns and Lai Power, and followed by an in-conversation with filmmaker Sean Burns.

INSPRING WITHLIVE PG

DIR. MIKHAIL KAUFMAN. UKRAINE 1929. 53 MINS.

A city symphony devoted to Kyiv. Reportedly lost until 2005, this 1929 Soviet Ukrainian experimental documentary not only observes the progress of daily life but draws the audience in from being an observer to an active participant. Director Mikhail Kaufman is best known as the cinematographer (on screen and off) in *Man with a Movie Camera* (1929), directed by his brother Dziga Vertov (aka Denis Kaufman).

Accomplished Ukrainian composer and pianist Roksana Smirnova takes to the stage with long-term collaborator and countryman Misha Kalinin to provide a powerful and evocative live score.







A woman fights to gain freedom from an abusive marriage while trying to protect her young daughter in an intense and gripping drama.

Set in mid-1990s Australia, the film shows Shayda making preparations for the Persian New Year while living in a women's refuge with six-year-old Mona. She has filed for divorce from her husband Hossein,

but he is determined that the whole family will return to Iran once he has completed his studies. With a compelling performance from Zar Amir Ebrahimi (Holy Spider) in the title role, the film conveys a creeping sense of threat and foreboding. But it also conjures up the positive bond between mother and daughter, and the moments of joy and solace that can be found through friendship, music and dance.

Written and directed by Noora Niasari, this debut feature picked up the Audience Award in the World Cinema Dramatic competition at the 2023 Sundance Film Festival. Shayda is a thoughtful portrait of a woman's attempts to achieve independence.

The film is directed with great sensitivity by Elene Naveriani (Wet Sand) and Eka Chavleishvili is utterly compelling as the protagonist experiencing a mid-life sexual awakening. Blackbird Blackbird Blackberry is a sensual testimony to the joys of solitude and female autonomy.

An intricate and multi-layered exploration of friendship, bullying and societal pressures in the latest offering from award-winning director Hirokazu Kore-eda.


Monster scooped Best Screenplay for writer Yûji Sakamoto and the Queer Palm at this year's Cannes Film Festival. It is Kore-eda's first Japanese language film since his Palme d'Or winning Shoplifters in 2018.

Opening with a mysterious fire, the film initially focuses on a single mother's quest

to uncover the reasons for her young son's troubling behaviour. With echoes of Rashomon, the same events are revisited from the perspective of different characters. The mysterious layers of meaning are enhanced by the late composer and musician Ryuichi Sakamoto's evocative score, as the truth of what is really going on is gradually revealed. With his customary warmth and humanity, Kore-eda shows that if we look closely, there is beauty to be found in relationships, however messy and complex they may be.

ROBOT DREAMS



DUKE'S AT KOMEDIA SUN 19 NOV / 3:15PM

A touching relationship between a dog and robot in 80s New York is brought to life in a charming animation for all ages.

Adapted from Sara Varon's graphic novel and staying true to its cartoon strip style, this poignant story depicts the companionship which grows after Dog buys a self-assembly robot kit for company. At first Dog and Robot have fun hanging out together, roller skating, eating hotdogs and walking hand-in-hand around the city. But an excursion to the beach unexpectedly places their friendship in jeopardy.

Robot Dreams is the first animation film by award-winning director Pablo Berger; his acclaimed earlier film Blancanieves was a silent drama, and Robot Dreams is also dialogue-free, with nods to the work of Buster Keaton and Charlie Chaplin. The film makes effective use of sound design and music (particularly the yearning, infectious soul of September by Earth, Wind and Fire) to conjure up the mood of 1980s New York. As well as a love letter to the Big Apple, Robot Dreams is a thoughtful reflection on the delights and anguish of friendship.

The search for a missing woman uncovers more questions than answers in an epic multi-layered mystery set in Argentina.

Split into two feature-length parts which are structured in 12 distinct chapters, *Trenque Lauquen* builds an intriguing portrait of Laura, a botanist, who has disappeared while working on a project to classify rare flowers. As her boyfriend and colleague delve deeper into her disappearance, fragments of other hidden stories are gradually revealed - an enigmatic scientist, a secret relationship, and rumours of a mutant creature seen in

a lake. The men are forced to question how well they really knew Laura, and if she really wants to be found.

The film playfully draws on various genres with elements of thriller, sci-fi, and romance, anchored by a strong central performance from Laura Paredes, who co-wrote the script. Echoing the themes of her debut feature *Ostende* (which also starred Paredes as a young woman exploring other people's lives), this follow-up by director Laura Citarella is an engrossing and memorable piece of filmmaking.


